<u>DUKE ENERGY MAKES GRANT TO SUPPORT</u> BOOK HARVEST SUMMER PROGRAM WITH LOCAL STUDENTS

Duke Energy announced today that it will make a grant of \$5,000 in support of Book Harvest and its Books on Break program running at all 30 Durham Public Schools elementary schools this spring.

Books on Break, a cornerstone program of Book Harvest, invites participating children to select books to take home to keep in time for summer. Research shows that access to books combats summer learning loss and help participating children return to school in the fall ready to learn.

Book Harvest kicks off its sixth year of Books on Break this month. The Duke Energy funds will help ensure that the selection of books being shared with the children are high interest, culturally diverse, and language-appropriate.

"Access to books that students can see themselves in helps those students maintain reading skills through the summer and to push back – a lot -- against summer learning loss," said Ginger Young, founder of Book Harvest, the non-profit organization that sponsors Books on Break in partnership with Durham Public Schools. "The nearly 1,500 brand new books that these funds will make possible will go far to help Durham's young readers preserve the hard-won gains they are reaping in their classrooms this spring. We are delighted by and grateful for this investment by Duke Energy in our kids' academic success."
